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Celebrating our young Swiss citizens

The Jungbürger (young citizen) ceremony has a long tradition in many municipalities in Switzerland where young people that have turned 18 are celebrated and initiated as fully fledged citizens and members of the community with all the rights and obligations that entails. The tradition lives on in Australia where events were held in Sydney and Melbourne.

Sydney

The elegant halls of the Swiss residence buzzed with excitement as 15 young adults gathered to celebrate a milestone: all turn 18 years this year. This is more than just a birthday; it's a gateway to a world of possibilities. These young men and women are standing at the threshold of adulthood, ready to embrace new-found rights and responsibilities.

In his speech and before raising a toast to the young Swiss citizens, Consul General Rolf Frei

emphasised the privilege and importance of Switzerland's direct democracy and invited all to participate in future votes. He also briefly touched upon the good and growing bilateral trade relations between Switzerland and Australia.

Beat Knoblauch, Delegate for Australia to the Council of the Swiss Abroad, gave an overview of the important work the Council does for the Swiss citizens living abroad. His address was followed by a talk by Daniel Frutiger, a long serving President of the Swiss Club in New South Wales. He invited the young adults to join the numerous and fun gatherings organised by the Swiss Club.



On 8 April, the young Swiss residing in New South Wales gathered at the Swiss Residence in Sydney for a reception hosted by the Consul General of Switzerland Rolf Frei, with participation of Council of the Swiss Abroad Beat Knoblauch and the President of the Swiss Club of NSW Daniel Frutiger.

in Hobart and Melbourne –
November 2024



**Ensure your civil status information
is up-to-date**

Do you plan to take advantage of the opportunity to renew your passport in Hobart or Melbourne? Make sure your civil status is updated with the Consulate General of Switzerland in Sydney in order for the representation to inform the competent civil status authority in Switzerland. Please note that registering a civil status change can take up to three months. Passport applications can only be processed once the registration has been completed in Switzerland. Furthermore, please ensure that your email address is up-to-date in the records of the representation in Sydney.

Registered citizens of the respective areas will be contacted by email 2-3 months prior to the visit with detailed information regarding dates, procedure and venues.

NSW: Swiss Community Care Society (SCCS NSW)

After hearing different stories of dual citizens (Swiss/Australian) falling ill when holidaying in Switzerland, I would like to give some travel advise.

■ When going on a trip, even for travelling within remote Australia: make sure you have a good **travel insurance and take a copy of the insurance paper with you**. Medical costs can skyrocket, especially if you need hospital care. In Switzerland you have to pay an upfront amount for your treatment. As you are not registered in Switzerland, you will not have a **compulsory medical insurance** which all Swiss registered citizens need to have. They either want your compulsory medical insurance number (if you live in Switzerland), or a means for you to pay. Having a travel insurance will help you at a later stage to get your money back depending on how you are insured. If you need an operation, it can easily be an amount of \$30,000. This means that...

■ You need to think about how you would pay such a bill. Is your credit card limit big enough? Would you have this kind of money in one of your savings accounts? So: **have a financial safety cushion**.

I also believe that it is preferable to enter Switzerland with your Swiss passport or ID card. Although you are accepted with the Australian document, you could have a problem prolonging your stay, once the 90 days for foreigners are up. It is also pleasant to queue in the Swiss/EU line at passport control rather than the others, as it is usually much faster.

For getting back into Australia you must leave here and re-enter with the **Australian passport**. If you have Australian residency only, or haven't bothered to acquire an Australian passport, you need a re-entry visa.

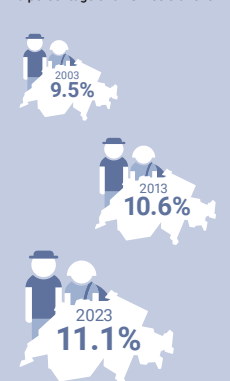

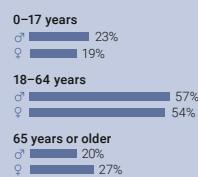

Swiss citizens living abroad as a percentage of all Swiss citizens

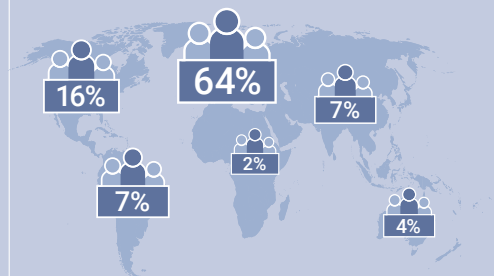


Swiss citizens living abroad by sex and age group

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At the end of 2023, 813,400 Swiss nationals were living abroad. This number has increased since 2022 by 13,400 people or +1.7%, as announced recently by the Federal Statistical Office (FSO). Compared with 2022, their number increased on most continents: Asia +3.1%, Europe +1.9%, **Oceania +1.2%**, North America +1.0%, Latin America and the Caribbean +0.4%. The number for Africa has declined by –0.2%.

Council of the Swiss Abroad meets in Bern

“En Bäre diensch leischte”

Bears have already been known as a strong, but somewhat dim-witted creatures since the Middle Ages and in the 17th century, the French poet Jean de la Fontaine wrote the tale of a bear and his friend, who accidentally gets killed because the bear tries to kill a fly on his nose with a stone while he was sleeping. The saying **En Bäre diensch leischte** is likely to originate from the French original **Rendre un service d'ours** as is the English equivalent **Render a bear's service**, meaning to do more harm than good with the best intentions.
